TREEHOUSE DESIGN

GRADE: K-2

TIME: 20-25 minutes

Inspired by nature, Frank Lloyd Wright worked to make his designs a part of the natural landscape as much as possible. In this lesson, participants are introduced to Wright's concept of Organic Architecture and challenged to design a house located high up in a tree's branches.

INTEGRATED SUBJECTS: Visual Art & Science

MATERIALS & RESOURCES

Drawing paper Pencils Color pencils, markers, or crayons Tree drawing (at end of lesson plan) Examples of Frank Lloyd Wright's designs

OBJECTIVES

- 1. Introduce Frank Lloyd Wright, the job of an architect, and the concept of Organic Architecture.
- 2. Challenge creative and critical thinking.
- 3. Explore the influence of nature on man-made structures.

ESSENTIAL QUESTIONS

- 1. How did nature inspire Frank Lloyd Wright's designs?
- 2. How can different types of lines communicate different meaning?
- 3. Can a design problem have more than one solution?

LESSON PROCEDURE

- Introduce Frank Lloyd Wright as an important American architect and designer. Briefly share some examples of his work and explain the importance and presence of nature in his designs. <u>https://www.teachingbydesign.org/multimedia/</u>
- Lead a brief discussion about the role of a architect and designer.
- **Present participants with the design challenge:** Design a house that will sit inside the tree's branches without cutting down or changing any part of the tree.
- After participants have had time to work on their designs, provide time for them to share and see other solutions to the design problem.
